## Fly Line 101

In the past month I have had a couple of phone calls asking about fly lines. I am attempting to share a simple explanation of Fly lines.

Fly lines are classified by weight, taper, and density (if they float or sink). Fly lines are categorized by weight into a number system, which runs from number 1, which is the lightest, to number 15, which is the heaviest. The lighter lines are more delicate in presentation, and they cast small flies well. The heavier lines are less delicate in presentation, but provide the power to cast large, windresistant, and heavy flies. Fly lines in the 4-10 range are the most common... Most trout fishing situations call for a line between 4-6. For bass, line weights between 7-9 should be ideal. Panfish rods fall between the trout and bass rod. The chart below may clarify things a little bit for you, but please keep in mind this chart is just a generalization. It is to be used only as a rough guide.

The density of fly lines also differ. There are floating lines which are meant to always stay on top of the water's surface. There are sinking lines which are meant to stay below the surface, and there are lines that fall in between the two different categories. Your first fly line should be a floating line. They are the most common, the most versatile, and the easiest to learn with.

The tapers also differ to suit different conditions. There are five main types of fly line tapers:

- 1 (WF) weight forward (this is the standard taper for trout fishing).
- 2 Bass bug/saltwater/muskie tapers, (Specialty fly lines).
- 3 (DT) double taper (good fly line for trout fishing, unless you need to make long casts or it's windy).
- 4 (ST) shooting taper (basically a weight forward line on steroids).
- 5 (L) level (has the exact same width and weight the entire length of the line. It floats great, the least expensive of all fly lines, but is more difficult to cast and control. I would not recommend a beginner to use this type of line).
