

President's Message

Wicked Winter weather did not stifle this year's Lunker Dinner. We had an excellent turn-out of both new and old members. This year we outgrew our capacity of Fleming Hall for a Lunker Dinner. I was looking for an alternate site and Ken Hicks suggested that the DAV would make a great meeting place and he was correct. By having the catered dinner, it set the stage for having a relaxed, fun-filled environment to visit and swap some fish stories.

In case some of you haven't heard, KC winter trout fishing program had all of the trout lakes stocked by the MDC on Feb. 14th. This past Saturday, March 2nd, I drove out to James A. Reed Wildlife Area to inspect the ice. Plover Lake was wide open. So, even though we are kissed by another artic blast, local trout fishing is not that far away. March will be the last month the MDC will stock trout for the winter trout program in the Kansas City area.

Looking for something different? Consider the <u>Sowbug Round-up</u> in Mountain Home Ar., Mar 28-30, 2019. It is a three day fly tying fly fishing show with over 100 fly tyers and many quality vendors. It is held at the Baxter County Fairgrounds in Mt. Home. It is close to the Arkansas State University-Mt. Home campus. This event is put on by the <u>North Arkansas Fly Fishers</u>. They have been doing this for decades and it is one of the best show. Check the <u>Sowbug webpage</u>, it has all the information. A trip to Mt. Home will also put you in the middle of some of the best trout fishing in the country. I've made reservations, how about checking it out.

Overlining A Fly Rod - Do or Don't by Gary Davisson



It's interesting to me how people are either adamantly against overlining (putting a 6- or 7-weight fly line on a 5-weight rod, for example) or totally in favor of it. I'm somewhere in the middle. On the one hand, rods are built to handle specific lines for a reason. That being said, the moment you put a 6-weight line on a 5-weight rod, the rod becomes a 6-weight, right? The advantages of doing this are that the heavier line loads the rod more, you can feel that when you cast, it can help you fling heavier flies, and bust casts into heavy headwinds. It can also help turn over a longer leader when you use one.

Some people worry that this is a crutch. If you get too dependent on the heavy line, they say that it ultimately fouls up your casting stroke (I do not believe this). They say just figure out how to cast an 8-weight rod with an 8-weight line in the wind, or else go up in size when you know you will <u>cast larger flies?</u>

Of course, there are no rules for any of this, and I admire how anglers adapt and adjust their gear to optimize performance and success. I'd never criticize anyone for over-lining, or refusing to do so, for that matter. I don't think it's like throwing deflated footballs in an NFL playoff game. But are you cheating yourself and your own skill development by using fly lines off label?

In my opinion a well-designed rod should work with 2- or 3-line weights easily. Of course, on the light end of the spectrum 1-3 wt this is probably narrow but in mid ranges 4-6 one can play around with line weights quite a bit. Then say your using a Sage One or Sage X, they will cast the rated line weight and at least 2 up very easily, but never down.

I think if done in moderation, in specific situations, it's probably a good thing. Gary

Hook: #04-08 Gamakatsu SL45 or Tiemco Black 2499 SP-BL

Eyes: Medium to Large Black Brass Eyes

Thread: Olive UTC 140

Tail: Tan or Ginger Woolly Bugger Marabou Legs: Yellow Chartreuse Barred and Speckled

Body: Stonefly Nymph Gill SLF Whitlock Dub-

Collar: Natural India Hen Back

Head: Stonefly Nymph Gill SLF Whitlock Dub-



New Missouri State Record Caught at Taneycomo



Paul Crews of Neosho, MO, landed the biggest brown trout Saturday anyone's ever caught in the state of Missouri to date. It was officially weighed by Missouri Department of Conservation Fisheries Biologist Shane Bush and documented at 34 pounds and 10 ounces. That beat the previous state record by a little more than six pounds, caught by Scott Sandusky of Arnold, MO, in November, 2009, also on Lake Taneycomo.

Crews and partner, Jimmy Rayfield of Salem, MO, were fishing together in a trout tournament hosted by Lilleys' Landing Resort & Marina on upper Lake Taneycomo. It's called the Vince Elfrink Memorial, named after Vince who was an avid sportsman, husband, father, and friend to many of the participants of the contest, including Crews and Rayfield. Vince passed away in 2011 of brain cancer at the age of 52. And just so happens that the pair won last year's tournament, sealed by a 21-inch brown trout Rayfield had caught.
