Fishing Outside the Box

To encourage members to expand their thoughts on other places to use their flyfishing skills, our club has had presentations on saltwater fly fishing in the Bahama's, fly fishing in Alaska for trout and salmon and Steelhead fishing in Michigan. If you are not interested in flying and the cost of a long-distance fly-fishing adventure, I thought I would give you some places to travel to within 500 miles or less. You know and have fished the state parks of Missouri; Bennett Springs, Roaring River and Montauk and you have probably been to Taneycomo at Branson. Let's get started with some new places to go:

The North Fork of the White River:



The North Fork of the White River is one of the finest trout streams in the state of Missouri as well as the Ozark Mountains. It has a good population of wild rainbow trout and trophy size brown trout. Stocking of the rainbow trout was stopped in 1964 and the stream has since maintained a good population of wild rainbows. The brown trout are still stocked but only in part of the river. Both the rainbows and the brown trout grow to very

nice sizes. Rainbows are taken up to eighteen inches long and the brown trout commonly reach sizes much larger than that.

This beautiful stream starts at Rainbow Spring, one of the largest in the state of Missouri, and flows for over twelve miles into Norfork Lake. Smaller springs along the way add to the flow. The stream can be waded or fished from a canoe or small raft type boat. There is some private property along its course but under Missouri law you are not trespassing when you are in the streambed.

The area between Rainbow Springs and Patrick Bridge is referred to as the Missouri Wild Trout Management Area. In 1998, the stocking of brown trout was stopped in this part of the river. This has allowed the rainbows in this part of the river to grow faster and larger because they have more to eat. Only flies and artificial lures can be used in the Wild Trout Management Area. Approximately 75% of the trout in this part of the river are wild rainbows. Anglers are only allowed one trout, either brown or rainbow but not both, over 18 inches per day. From the Patrick Bridge down to Norfork Lake, the river comes under the Missouri Special Trout Regulations. This area is stocked with brown trout, but not rainbows. Barry and I fished the river a number of years ago and stayed at a bed/ breakfast that is no longer open. One of the prettiest streams in Missouri.

Location: Tecumseh, Mo **Distance** from KC: 250 miles **Places** to Stay: River of Life Farm

Fishing Outside the Box Cont'd:




Shoals Dam. The Corps of Engineers determines how much water to release into the river based on flood control and electric power demand. The water level in the White River can drop or rise fast at any time of day depending on how many electric power generators the Corps runs. Fishermen must know what the water level currently is and what it is likely to do. Water fluctuations can cause hazardous situations when unexpected, so be alert! The first three quarters of a mile below the Dam is catch and release only and only barbless hooks. The other catch and release area is at the Rim Shoals access area.

Location: Cotter AR Distance from KC: 260 miles Places to Stay: Gaston's / Motel's / State Campground

Little Red River in Arkansas:

The Little Red River is known for its fine brown trout fishing but it is also stocked with brook, cutthroat and rainbow trout. This river has some huge brown trout in its gin clear water. It's cold, water comes from the Greer's Ferry Dam at a temperature of about forty-seven degrees yearround.

Location: Heber Springs, AR Distance from KC: 340 miles Places to Stay: Lindsey's Resort / Red River Trout Dock /Heber Springs Motels /John F. Kennedy Park Campground



Norfork River, Arkansas:

The Norfork River is a tailwater below the Norfork Dam and is only about 4.5 miles long and flows into the White River. It offers some of the best trout fishing and is one of the rivers in which you can catch the grand slam of trout, Rainbow, Brown, Brook and Cutthroat. Be sure to visit Two Rivers Fly Shop in the small town of Norfork. Norfork Café was a good place to eat, or it's a short drive to Mountain Home where there is lot's of places to satisfy your pallet.

Location: Norfork AR. **Distance** from KC: 280 miles **Places** to stay: Norfork River Resort, Army Corp of Engineers has a great campground directly below Norfork Dam.



Lower Mountain Fork River Oklahoma

This river extends for 12 miles below the Broken Bow Dam and is perfect for trout fishing. The first several miles are of trout fishing are located in Beaver's Bend State Park. The water is regularly stocked with brown and rainbow trout every month. This allows for stock to stay high, which gives great opportunities for catching! Besides trout, the lower river also has bass and walleye. If you are looking for a location to fish year-round, this spot is perfect as it is open all year long; however, from November thru March it has excellent fly fishing.

Location: Broken Bow, Oklahoma Distance: from KC: 430 miles Places to Stay: Beaver's Bend State Park, Broken Bow, Oklahoma. Fly shop: Beavers Bend Fly Shop & Guide Service.

Fishing Outside the Box Cont'd:



Waterloo Creek Iowa:

This is one of the real draws for trout anglers in Iowa. The river is a tributary of the Iowa River and is an absolute cracker to fish. The river is stocked each week from April to November with both brook trout and rainbow trout. Generally, these all fall between the 10-to-12-inch size range. However, a good number of larger rainbows are introduced throughout the season.

Another draw of this creek is the population of breeding brown trout that can be caught. These can grow to large sizes and hooking one of these specimens highlights any trip. Latest estimates have

shown a population of at least 700 brown trout per mile throughout the creek's 10-mile length. These are trickier to catch, and stealth and patience are required, but the results are worth it!

The fishery is split into two distinct sectors, the upper sector down to highway 76 is where the river is stocked, and the fishing is open to most methods. The water is strictly catch and release below this, and the methods are restricted to artificial lure and fly only. Access to the water is fairly easy even though the land around it is, in most part, privately owned. This is due in no small part to the agreement that the Iowa DNR has made with landowners to allow access to the state's streams and creeks.

I want to thank the Perfect Fly Store for it's help with some information on the North Fork of the White. I hope I have encouraged you to do some research and go fishing at some of these destinations. *Gary*



One Fly Tournament rules:
